KEY VOCABULARY:	
WORDS	MEANING
<b>Bakery</b>	a shop that sells bread, cakes, pastries, pies etc
<b>Butcher</b>	a shop that sells meat products
<b>Farm</b>	where animals and crops are raised and grown
<b>Fast food</b>	food that is prepared and served quickly
<b>High street</b>	an area of a town where many of the shops and businesses are found
<b>Newsagent</b>	a shop that sells papers, magazines, confectionery etc
<b>Plant</b>	a living organism that gets its food through photosynthesis
<b>Processed</b>	food that has been treated by chemicals or changed in some way
<b>Supermarket</b>	a shop that offers a wide variety of foods and products.

KEY KNOWLEDGE:
<b>QUESTION 1: What is farming?</b>
<b>ANSWER</b> Farming is when plants and animals are grown or reared on a large scale for people to eat. There are three main types of farm: arable, pastoral and mixed. Arable farms produce crops (for example wheat or vegetables), pastoral farms raise animals for meat, wool and dairy and mixed farming is when a farm does both.
<b>QUESTION 2: Where do the plants we eat come from and how are they grown?</b>
<b>ANSWER</b> The food in our supermarkets comes from all over the world but some is produced locally. Farmers prepare the ground and sow seeds to produce crops. They grow into plants and produce the fruit and vegetables we buy.
<b>QUESTION 3: What are animals farmed for in the UK?</b>
<b>ANSWER</b> Animals are farmed for meat primarily but also for a range of other products such as leather, sheepskin, wool and dairy products like cheese yoghurt and milk.
<b>QUESTION 4: What traditional foods originate in the UK?</b>
<b>ANSWER</b> Traditional British foods that originated in the UK include: <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Roast beef and Yorkshire pudding</li><li>• Fish and chips</li><li>• Shepherds pie</li><li>• Lancashire hotpot</li><li>• Pie, mash and parsley liquor</li><li>• Bubble and squeak</li></ul>
